On behalf of the GVCA Board of Directors, we would like to wish you all health and happiness for 2024!

We are pleased to present to you our Spring edition of the News and Views. On behalf of the GVCA Board of Directors, we are truly excited to continue our planning towards Guildwood Day on June 1st, 2024. We are happy to announce that this will be the 50th Anniversary of Guildwood Day! There will be games, prizes, entertainment, food, and of course, our annual parade. We hope to see you there!

As the weather gets better and allows us to explore more of the Guildwood Village, I would encourage you all to visit our local Pollinator Habitat. This project was initiated due to the Emerald Ash borer infestation. The City removed 165 trees and 66 trees were injected with a systemic insecticide in an attempt to preserve them.

Trees come in 1/2 gallon buckets and are small enough to carry on the TTC or sit in the back of a car. All trees and shrubs must be planted on private property within the City of Toronto boundaries.

Boulevard Gardening In Guildwood Last fall, the Guildwood Butterflyway Project applied for a PollinateTO grant from the City of Toronto to cover the costs of native plants for 17 boulevard gardens in Guildwood. Unfortunately,

our application was declined, along with several others in Guildwood (for two pollinator gardens at local schools and one for a wildflower giveaway at Guild Park). The City staff mentioned that they were overwhelmed with applications for this popular grant program which is an important part of the City's pollinator strategy. Knowing that there were limited funds available, we weren't all that surprised when we received the news in January, although our 17 homeowners were, of course, very disappointed. However, it's important to know that, in Toronto, you don't need a permit to replace the turfgrass on your boulevard (which is the space between the sidewalk and the street), and there are many advantages to replacing it:

- Lawns do nothing to support pollinators or biodiversity. They are literally a sterile environment.
- Creating a boulevard garden with native plants decreases habitat fragmentation, allowing native pollinator species such as bees and butterflies to thrive using these "pollinator pathways".
- Native plants provide food and shelter for birds and other wildlife throughout the year, supporting resilience and diversity of the species that evolved in this climate.
- Replacing turfgrass with native wildflower gardens means lower maintenance overall.
- Imported ornamental flowers are not the best support for our native bees, birds, butterflies, and other wildlife. Boulevard gardens planted with native plants are both beautiful and purposeful.

Call Before You Dig!

Before removing boulevard grass, we recommend that you arrange for an underground utility locator. This is a free service and is usually done very quickly after making the request via the Ontario OneCall web site: <u>ontarioonecall.</u> <u>ca</u>.

Spring Native Plant Sale - May

This year, the Guildwood Butterflyway's annual spring native plant sale will focus on plants that are appropriate for boulevard gardens which means they are selected for salt-tolerance, low height, and low maintenance. Included in our sale are also many host plants for butterflies and moths. Most gardeners are aware of the close connection between monarch butterflies and milkweed, but there are many other species of butterflies and moths who cannot survive without the larval host plants that their caterpillars need in order to grow until they form their chrysalis or cocoon. Our plant list this year is carefully curated to include both boulevard plants and host plants. Our spring sale will take place in mid to late May over several weekends. Pollinator Week Wildflower Giveaway - June

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Tax Time ... Still?

As I write this article in mid-March, tax season is upon us. By the end of February, you should have received your tax slips thereby giving you approximately two months to complete and file your income tax by April 30th.

So why write an article about taxes that you will be reading in May? Because right now, I'm busy volunteering with the Canadian Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP)

completing tax returns for the 2023 tax season. But from the months of May to December, I will be filing tax returns that range from 2023 all the way back to 2014 (10 years worth per person). I am a year round income tax volunteer with WoodGreen Community Services and after the April 30th tax season deadline, WoodGreen offers the ability for back taxes to be filed.

The CVITP program enables eligible people who have a modest income and a simple tax return to have their taxes done for free. You can find more information and eligibility criteria on the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) website, at https://www.canada.ca/en/revenue-agency/services/tax/ individuals/community-volunteer-income-tax-program/lend-a-hand-individuals/about.html. In 2022, there were 5,300 CVITP volunteers in Ontario who filed 217,160 tax returns that helped 186,450 individuals!

The clients I help may include seniors, modest-income individuals, newcomers, persons with disabilities, Indigenous Peoples, students and youths. Their income is at or below \$35,000/year for one person and they have a simple tax return. Some community organizations have more lenient income guidelines such as WoodGreen where the income eligibility starts at \$40,000/year for one person.

A Simple tax return would not include the following tax situations:

- Filed for bankruptcy
- Have rental or business income to report
- Have capital gains or losses to report
- Have investment income of more than \$1,000 per year
- Need to prepare a return for a deceased person
- Have self-employment income/deductions to claim

If you are interested in receiving this free service and you are eligible, you can search on the CRA website for free tax clinics near you. They can be in-person, walk-in, dropoff, appointment only or virtual and are they're available all over the city (and country!).

Super Summer Day Camps In July At The Clark Centre

There are two camps scheduled July 2-12 and July 15-26. During our two-week sessions, participants work together to create an original production with guidance from our creative and energetic staff. Through theatre games and activities that foster active participation, confidence building, and creative expression, kids will get the chance to partake in every element of our production including storytelling, playwriting, character development, set design, prop production, marketing, and dance. The two week day camp experience offers a special opportunity to develop a safe place from where the kids can let their creativity flow. Beyond the work we do on our craft in the studio, we also play a lot of team building and active summer camp games. There is always plenty of time spent running around outdoors as well as connecting to nature through walks and Beka's scavenger hunts.



A Brand New Original Play Every Session

When kids come to camp for the first time, they are hooked right away because we tell them that they get to make up the idea for the play and all of their own characters. Our job is to create a safe space where kids feel comfortable and inspired to share their creativity and engage with others in the collective creative process. Once this spark catches fire, it is such a thrill to witness



the process in action. The campers and leaders work together to brainstorm ideas and vote to determine the most popular choices that we can

combine to create a new play. From there, the kids make a list of characters that would be essential to tell the story and they choose their characters from that list. But of course, there is always room for a kitten or a puppy or a magical unicorn in any story we come up with so ultimately every camper can pick their own character to develop. The group is divided into scene groups and they workshop a scene that they share with the other groups and provide feedback and ideas. This collective creative

process is the heart of our play development as it invests all the creators in the building of the story. Along the way, we paint sets together, we design and source our costumes, we create props out of cardboard and other craft materials, and then we name and market our play with posters, and (spoiler alert) work on our traditional final dance number.



Community Partners

We are blown away by the love and support we have received

from the Guildwood community since we started our camps in 2022. With over 25 years of experience operating summer camps and children's theatre programs in The Beach, we knew that the program would be a success and that the Guildwood community would be a perfect place to expand our camp experience. The hardest part, coming out of the pandemic, was spreading the word that not only were day camps running but there was a super cool one right here in your backyard. Without a doubt, we could not have made it work without the support of our new friends in the neighbourhood. Families spread the word through traditional conversations about what they had their kids doing for the summer and also through social media channels. Karen Harkins and her amazing team at The Clark Centre for the Arts have been instrumental in making our space feel so special for the kids. They feel welcomed, loved, and safe as they participate in our programs in the beautiful building surrounded by nature. We are so lucky to have a strong

partnership with Guild Festival Theatre and their support to accommodate us on the Greek Stage during their busy rehearsal and performance schedule. It is such an energizing feeling to work next to other amazing theatre



people and to support each other in this community. Our performance day had a real cool vibe to it, with The Clark Centre for the Arts rolling out the red carpet for the actors,

and our friends Melissa Kitazaki and Aimee Talbot putting on a breakfast spread for all the parents to mix and mingle before the shows. Thank you to all of you for your continued support and enthusiasm for our camps, helping to create the magic of theatre for the kids.

Leadership Training For Youth

Our model for leadership development envisions all campers as potential staff members at our camp one day. Indeed, the majority of our staff have been campers in our programs and have developed their skills through our Leadership in Training program at camp. To kick-start the program in Guildwood, we connected with local volunteer high school students and others from Laurier's IB program. We are happy to say that two of our original LITs are now paid staff counselors at our camp. This summer, for the first time in this location, we will have campers from our first year that will now begin their leadership training and follow in their footsteps. Each camper can take a look at the leaders and staff and imagine themselves in that role one day. I can honestly say we have the best camp counselors because they are fully invested in preserving and promoting the culture of the camp and helping shape the experience for the campers to be as fun and rewarding as it was for them when they were campers. We are always looking for motivated, artistic, high school aged volunteers so if you know someone please have them get in touch with us through our website or drop by our tent on Guildwood Day.

Diversity, Equity, And Inclusion

At Theatricks summer camps, great care and attention are given to understanding, accepting, and valuing the uniqueness and diversity of all program participants regardless of their background, personal circumstances, or identity. Our program only works when it is deeply connected to making the learning and creativity personal and inclusive for everyone. It is within this environment that kids feel safe to express themselves and grasp the many rewards that a collective creation can provide, connecting them to each other and their community. One of the ways that we seek equity is through creating spaces in our programs offered in kind to deserving kids from partnered schools whose families may not have the means to send them to a day camp. We appreciate the love and care from those educators entrusted with identifying and offering these spaces and have benefitted so much from the contributions to our camp from these families and amazing kids.

This was in the 1960s when his late father was the Vice President of the GVCA and Guildwood Day was one of his responsibilities. Timo has worn many different hats in life such as a Toolmaker, an IMAX Camera Technician (responsible for the Space Shuttle, In Cabin Camera), a Military Specification CAD Draughtsman, a Lighting Design Draughtsman, and to this day a Small Business Manager (Guildwood Physiotherapy) and a Property Manager.

What is the best part of working with the GVCA? "Camaraderie and friendship, and the occasional reward when some project or issue succeeds".

Presenting: John P. Mason, Director at Large



John was introduced to Guildwood Village and the Guild by the woman who is now his wife. Their first date in Scarborough was on a Sunday morning walk-about at the Guild Inn. The Inn was still operating for Sunday brunches but John felt it had seen better days. He thought the grounds

were quite magical and was curious about the many beautiful facades. The whole area was fascinating to him and seemed to have so much potential. After they moved here in 2001, they watched as the buildings at Guild Park almost disintegrated before their eyes over the next decade - by fire, vandalism and neglect.

In 2011, the National Trust for Canada included Guild Park on its Top 10 List of the Most Endangered Historic Places across the country. That was John's call to action since he didn't want to live in a community with a heart that was falling apart and being, as the National Trust described it, an example of "demolition by neglect". Collaborating with a friend, John created an advocacy video titled, "The Guild Inn: Save It!" which won a prize from Heritage Toronto (coming second to one from the National Film Board). That success tapped into a groundswell of support coming from the GVCA, the Guild Renaissance Group (GRG), Park People (an urban park charity) and many people who wanted to do something about the Guild. He joined the GVCA board and worked on its special task force on Guild Park's future. This group of four local volunteers proposed creating a new "Friends" group to bring Guild Park back from the brink of demolition. The GVCA accepted this proposal, then created a collaborative working group with reps from the existing Guild Park volunteer organizations. Based on further research into best practices of similar groups, and with strong support from the community and City Hall, Friends of Guild Park (FGP) was born in 2013.

"As FGP's founding president, I'm proud of the group's many successes - achieved by the team of committed and collaborative volunteers who've brought amazing ideas, energy and persistence to this landmark public destination - a place where art meets nature. None of this would have been possible without the terrific support - which continues today - from the GVCA." John enjoys being active on the GVCA board for the collaboration among volunteers and the important role that the GVCA plays in creating a strong sense of community spirit. As one example, the GVCA continues to work closely with Friends of Guild Park to foster a unified approach on the many plans to improve and revitalize Guild Park. Together with volunteer colleagues from GRG, and the Guild Festival Theatre, they've developed a combined community voice that brings activities, attention and advocacy to the site. Through a continuing liaison with the many City officials responsible for different aspects of Guild Park, their joint successes include:

- the opening of the Clark Centre for the Arts
- the naming of that facility and its Gallery 191 exhibition halls
- the rebuilding, reopening and operating of the
- Sculptor's Cabin, in partnership with the City
- the new Entry/Pergola for the Forest Boardwalk
- the improved electrical system at the Greek Theatre
 raising funds to install Guild Park's first official heritage
- plaque to recognize the site's historic significance, pluslots of walks, programs and events from Doors Open
- to Arts in the Park events.

The GVCA has also provided opportunities for him to meet and work with talented groups of volunteer residents on projects such as:

- creating the Guildwood Village flag
- having the City install the community welcome signs
- being involved with the News & Views quarterly

publication

• helping with popular events, ranging from Guildwood Day and the GVCA annual meeting, to the GVCA's 60th anniversary gala reception.

John sees one of the greatest challenges the GVCA is facing is to develop the next generation of volunteers which is crucial to ensure our village continues to thrive and grow. It's clear that the best improvements happen when the community gets actively involved. Officials from all levels of government rely on the informed and persistent voices of resident associations such as the GVCA. Also, it's very challenging for individual residents to know how to make their views known to government officials and the GVCA brings important perspectives on issues to our neighbourhood.

The GVCA has more than 60 years' experience representing its members. It's one of the longest-serving community associations - and among the most active - in Toronto. The way the GVCA weathered the financial crisis from the pandemic is another mark of our association's strength and good management. The GVCA's annual membership fee is a small investment to keep the GVCA's voice strong and active. The GVCA also welcomes residents who can contribute some time. There's probably a local issue that interests you or affects your family, so we hope you consider playing a role. That's how John and so many other GVCA members - got involved.



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New GVCA Housing Sub-Committee

The GVCA is receiving many requests from members who are concerned about significant housing developments and zoning variance applications

in Guildwood Village. The big jump in these requests requires the GVCA to take a new approach to serving local residents.

In the past, one or two GVCA volunteers could handle each inquiry individually. This is no longer effective. Governments are quickly adopting new policies to face today's housing issues. These policies are intended to fast-track new housing options, especially in Toronto. This has led to substantially more construction, renovations and demolition across Guildwood Village.

GVCA members are telling us they're worried about how these new developments are affecting them as neighbours and affecting Guildwood Village as a neighbourhood. The GVCA is being asked to ensure that the municipal decisions about new development are made to enhance both our neighbourhood and our city.


The GVCA is effective when it takes an informed, community-wide approach to helping our neighbourhood thrive and grow. Rather than being anti- or prodevelopment, the GVCA advocates on behalf of our members on a wide range of issues affecting Guildwood Village. Our aim is to ensure that housing and related issues receive appropriate and fair consideration at all levels of government.

The GVCA's advocacy on housing is guided by the city of Toronto's Official Plan. That plan describes how development across city neighbourhoods is intended to fit the general character of each neighbourhood. This allows neighbourhoods to evolve under changing conditions. Given the flurry of development activity in Guildwood Village, it's important that GVCA has a strong and informed voice on today's housing discussions.

Call For Volunteers

To do this effectively, the GVCA needs help from its members. Our plan is to create a special team of volunteers to deal with these many housing questions. This working group will identify better ways for our association to address the growing concerns and ensure appropriate housing is available in Guildwood Village. Under the GVCA's direction and working to a specific deadline, this group will develop a fact-based, practical approach to handle current and future housing concerns in Guildwood Village. This team will actively engage with neighbours, policymakers and others involved in housing.

The GVCA anticipates this opportunity will interest GVCA members affected by local housing development, as well as those interested in long-term community, real estate, and planning issues. GVCA Vice-President Jeff Garrah has agreed to head this working group once enough GVCA members step forward as volunteers. The Business of Making Art

Times are tough for the performing arts. While the pandemic has subsided, theatres across the country are struggling more than ever as the Ontario Arts Council and the Canada Council for the Arts have cut their budgets by \$5 million and \$10 million, respectively. In the midst

of an affordability crisis, venues are disappearing and companies that seemed too big to fail like Artscape and Just for Laughs have declared bankruptcy. And this isn't limited to government austerity: Scotiabank has stopped supporting the Contact Photography Festival, Bell no longer sponsors TIFF, and we've seen the same decrease in corporate support for the arts. When I speak with colleagues across Canada, it's the same story: increased costs, diminished budgets, and theatres on the brink of collapse.

Which makes me feel all the more fortunate when I consider GFT's incredible success over the last five years. We're one of the only companies whose audience has grown - nearly 400% over 2019! Our programming has also increased and we now employ over 100 artists and support staff to work on 70 events that bring thousands of people to Guild Park each summer.

I wish I could sav that these successes have made things easy for us. However, even as GFT's audience and impact has increased, our support from funders has decreased. After a string of rejected grants this year, we wonder when governments are going to make good on their promises to prioritize Scarborough and invest in the



cultural life of this incredible community. In 2023, the Toronto Arts Council dedicated just 3.6% of its budget to arts in Scarborough. And that is across all disciplines - music, dance, visual art, and theatre. Only 3.6% to a community that makes up 20% of Toronto's population. Now you might reasonably ask - if GFT is doing so well, why would we need government support? We need it to fund programs like Family Fest, which we're committed to keeping free in order that everyone in our community can access arts and culture. We need it to support the playwright's unit, which amplifies Scarborough's unique voice. We need it to provide youth with training, mentorship, and early career opportunities.

As GFT continues to draw more visitors, we're working on several special projects to multiply our benefits to the community: introducing vendors to Family Fest, partnering with more local businesses on promotions, and introducing the Discovery Drive, an artistic tour of Guildwood that connects businesses, the park, and the GO station.

We absolutely love this community and are so grateful for your support. If you want to join us in building a flourishing arts scene here in Scarborough, here are a few things you can do:

- Promote local arts and culture and invite a friend to see a show in Guild Park this summer.
- Contact your city councillor, MPP, or MP and let them know that Scarborough needs more support from governments and arts councils.
- Volunteer with GFT and be an ambassador for the vibrant arts and culture here in Guildwood.

These next few years are going to be very difficult for performing artists all across the country, but we know that with the support of Guildwood, GFT will not just survive this storm, but thrive!



GFT is Scarborough's only professional theatre. Our plays and events at the iconic Greek Theatre attract tens of thousands of visitors to productions that reflect our diverse community. Join us this summer for five days of Family Fest, *Three Men on a Bike* (the hilarious

Red Fox

Spring has sprung, and I just love it. Warm air, blue skies, and the best part: a new round of migration is just around the corner. People often ask me why I take photos, especially why I take so many, and

wonder if I do it so I can sell my pictures. While I've sold a few, here and there, over the years, that's not why I've always got my camera. The main reason I'm out here is honestly quite simple: there's a thrill in finding something 'new.' Sometimes there's a new courtship behaviour I've never seen before, other times I notice a new feather colouration or colour combination, and every so often I still manage to spot an animal for the first time. While I admit that chickadees and sparrows all look the same, if I really look closely at my photos after a shoot, I can always find something to tell them apart. I think if I was trying to monetize my passion, it would take all the joy out of my hobby. I'll admit that I'm privileged in that I don't need the extra income as long as I don't buy a new lens or expect to go on birding vacations every few years!

Ok, on to the article topic at hand: red foxes! Red foxes are regularly seen in Guildwood and happen to be one of my favourite wildlife species. They are stunningly beautiful, athletic, cunning, and help control the local rodent population. While it may be hard to tell them apart, I've included a collage of fox photos (see next page) that focus on their faces so you can see the differences between them.

Ontario has three species of foxes: red, grey, and Arctic. There are a few populations of grey foxes across Ontario, but they are on the list of threatened and at-risk species. The Arctic fox lives in the tundra of northern Ontario, and the Canadian population is not considered to be at-risk. Red foxes, (Vulpes vulpes in the family Canidae) are by far the most common fox in Canada; they live across the entire Northern Hemisphere, in a few parts of the Southern Hemisphere, and even in parts of Australia. They are one of the most widespread species on the planet, living in forests, grasslands, mountains, deserts, and even tundra.

The red fox is a small mammal, smaller than most medium dog breeds, and is known for its rusty-red colour, sharp

pointed face and a light build that allows it to be agile. While most red foxes have red fur, other colour variations may occur, including brown, silver, black, and cross. The cross fox is one of many different colour





versions of a red fox and it actually has a black cross on his back! Red foxes have black ears and paws and a white throat, tail tip and underparts. Many would argue that the fox's long, bushy red

tail, with a white tip, is their best feature. Did you know that even the other coloured foxes still have a white tip of the tail? Males are known as "dogs", females as "vixens", and their young are called "kits" or "cubs." They breed in late December, with a litter of 4–6 kits being born in the spring.

In children's story books, foxes are often seen as cunning

and sly and make for good villains, but in reality they are actually quite shy, nervous, and highly secretive. They prefer to move around at dawn and dusk, and they eat many small mammals such as voles, mice, squirrels, and rabbits. They will also go after amphibians and

reptiles, turtle and duck eggs, and most insects that are big enough to be worth the hassle, such as cicadas. They are omnivorous, however, and will round out their diet with various fruits and vegetables from your garden. I've also seen them walking along the roadside looking for, and picking at, roadkill.

In addition to their beauty, their behaviour always makes them a great subject for photography. They are amazing parents to their kits, patiently playing with them and teaching them how to hunt. Both parents will stay with the kits, taking turns hunting, until the young ones are a



few months old and ready to go off on their own. I can see one a month, or every day, and the excitement of seeing them never gets tiring. There is a magic in seeing one getting ready

to pounce, roll in the grass or snow, or slide down a bank just for fun. I've even caught them intentionally peeing in the water bowl I leave outside. My favourite fox experience in the Guild was coming home from a photography walk, after seeing nothing all day, to find a red fox sleeping in my front yard. I don't even know if I pulled my car all the way into the driveway, I was so shocked at the sight. I watched as the vixen stretched on her back, rolled around, and casually got up and wandered away.

My happiest fox experience was working with the Toronto Wildlife Centre to successfully catch, treat, and release a mangy fox in Guildwood. This poor animal had been giving us the slip for almost two months, refusing to go into our traps, and disappearing for days at a time. We were genuinely getting worried that we wouldn't

catch her in time when we found her under a bush. With the help of my friend Margaret Crewe, we managed to catch the animal with a net. After some cheering, a few fist pumps, and a 2-month stint at the wildlife rehab centre, we released her back into the wild where she belonged.

While I really hope you enjoy these amazing animals as much as I do, it's important to remember a few things we can do to help them:

• If the animal looks like they are losing their body or tail fur, they may have mange, fleas, ticks, or something similar. If possible, take a picture with your camera or phone and send it to the Toronto Wildlife Centre. If it's a decent photo, they should be able to see what the fox has and come up with a plan to help it.

• Seriously, no matter how much you want to: do not feed them. They are skilled hunters and do NOT need our help. It's imperative that they don't start associating people with a reliable source of food handouts.

Many of you will recognize Azeem from his performances on the Guild Amphitheatre stage in plays put on by the Guild Festival Theatre. He is looking forward to reprising his role as Jay in Three Men on a Bike; the sequel to last summer's Three Men in a Boat, for which he garnered two Broadway World Toronto Award nominations in the Best Actor and Ensemble categories.

Since moving back to Canada in 2005. he has worked from coast to coast in theatre as well as on screen.

Azeem moved to Guildwood with his partner at the onset of the pandemic. There seemed to be a perfect balance between the diversity of the region and a growing arts scene. It also felt like a homecoming given his first foray

into the arts community of Toronto was in publishing with the Scarborough Music Theatre. As a result of his involvement with community theatre, he was inspired to acquire some training and pursue acting as a profession.

Alongside his acting career, Azeem began his journey in artistic leadership as one of nine co-producers of a 2017 indie production of Tragedie of Lear at the Palmerston Library in Toronto, which garnered six MyEntWorld's Critic's

Pick nominations. He was then mentored by Soheil Parsa as his Assistant Director for Modern Times Stage Company's 2018 production of Bloom at Buddies in Bad Times Theatre in Toronto.

From 2019 to 2022 he developed and produced his first play 1184 which was grounded in the convivencia or coexistence between Muslim, Christian and Jewish inhabitants of 12th century Andalusia. 1184 premiered at Theatre Passe Muraille's Mainspace, earning two Dora Mavor Moore Award nominations.

During this time, Azeem co-founded Phoenix Arts to provide Free Audition Clinics to performers in need during the COVID-19 pandemic. Later, Phoenix Arts would become a vehicle through which 1184 would be co-produced along with the Aga Khan Museum and continues to amplify voices of still marginalized communities. In continuing his journey as a playwright, Azeem was invited to Guild Festival Theatre's inaugural 2023-24 Creators' Unit to develop his second play 1462 which focuses on the rich history of female Muslim leadership in medieval times.

This year Azeem returns to co-direct Shakespeare for first year theatre performance students at George Brown College while also serving on the Board of Directors at Theatre Passe Muraille.

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


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
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

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Wastewater Management ... Why it Matters

stations, the City of Toronto's wastewater reaches one of four wastewater treatment plants, which operate 24/7 to protect our drinking water and environment.

Just a mere three kilometres east of Guildwood, in West Hill and at the mouth of Highland Creek, is the Highland Creek Treatment Plant (HCTP) at 51 Beechgrove Drive.

Keeping our water safe

Wastewater is liquid waste that is flushed down toilets and poured down sinks and drains. This material travels through the sanitary sewer system to HCTP or one of the other wastewater treatment plants. There it goes through several phases to remove solid material and be disinfected before it's released back into the lake. Solid material or "solids" that are removed from the water also go through treatment processes to reduce their volume, as well as any harmful bacteria and viruses.

Safe and effective treatment of wastewater is important to the continued health and well-being of Guildwood and other Toronto residents. The city's wastewater treatment process must follow strict regulations and meet or exceed standards set by The Water Resources Act in Ontario, as well as the federal government, to protect public health and the environment.

The 54-hectare wastewater treatment plant in West Hill serves 450,000 residences. To maintain a state of good repair and prepare for future challenges, HCPT has several significant capital projects that are ongoing, such as

- upgrades to its disinfection and dechlorination systemsinstallation of two new fluidized bed incinerators which
- includes state of the art air emissions control technology
- refurbishment of liquid treatment equipment, and
- installation of a new liquid treatment process.

The GVCA has been part of the HCTP Neighbourhood Liaison Committee since its inception.

How the HCTP protects you and the environment

Wastewater goes through various phases before treated water is released into Lake Ontario. These ongoing capital projects address key needs within phases throughout this treatment process.

Here's a glimpse of what happens during each phase:
1. Preliminary wastewater treatment – Removes large debris, including rocks, sticks, sand, silt and gravel that's washed into the sewer system. It also removes hygiene products, including tampons, dental floss and wipes,

which shouldn't be flushed but occasionally are.

2. Primary treatment - Uses large settling tanks to separate finer organic solid matter (human waste) from the wastewater. These separated solids are often called "raw sludge."

3. Secondary treatment - Using large tanks, plant technicians create and cultivate the optimal environment for microscopic organisms (microorganisms) to consume the dissolved, organic material remaining in the water, which they need to grow . These microorganisms also take in oxygen and exhale carbon dioxide, just like people do. At the end of this phase, another set of large settling tanks helps separate the treated water from the microorganisms. To do so, it directs the treated water to flow out the top and the microorganisms, now called 'waste activated sludge,' to settle at the bottom.

4. Water disinfection and dechlorination - The treated water, now called effluent, gets chlorinated to kill any remaining organisms. Then, just before it's returned to the lake, it gets dechlorinated to ensure no wildlife is affected. This effluent is rigorously sampled and tested to ensure it is safe and meets all provincial standards before it's returned to the lake.

5. Sludge disposal and fuel production - The waste activated sludge gets thickened to remove as much excess water as possible. It's then mixed with the raw sludge from primary treatment, and sent to another set of tanks.

These tanks are anerobic digesters, that deprive the sludge of all oxygen, are heated in order to create the perfect conditions for different sorts of microorganisms to grow. These new microorganisms break the sludge down, producing methane-rich "digester gas." This new type of gas can then be compressed and used to replace natural gas that fuels the hot-water boilers, which heat the plant. The digested sludge, now called biosolids, leaves the anerobic digesters, is dewatered again (using high speed centrifuges) and destroyed in the incinerators. Its ash is collected in large settling lagoons and hauled away once a year.

Controlling noise and odours

To minimize impacts on the surrounding area, noise and odour are controlled throughout the wastewater treatment process. For example, at HCTP, odourous air is collected and treated using a biofilter, which is a large box full of an inorganic media. The biofilter is kept warm and humid so it will grow a thin layer of microorganisms on top. Then, during many stages in the wastewater treatment process, odourous air is captured and powerful fans suck it through the biofilter. To grow, microorganisms in the biofilter consume sulfur-containing compounds in the air which in turn remove the odour before it is released into the environment. The next time you visit the great waterfront paths in East Point Park, a migratory staging area for monarch butterflies and over 178 species of birds (with ample parking for those wanting to go for a stroll) take a moment to stop and consider how this treatment plant is paramount in keeping our drinking water clean, while safeguarding wildlife. It has been actively doing so since 1956.

Give a Bike a New Home

For the past 37 years, my wife, Nancy, and I have been part of this wonderful Guildwood community. I have always been a fan of bicycles. As a child living in Scarborough, one of my major pastimes with friends was "riding around." Everyone I knew owned a tire patch kit and handled

their own bike repairs. Bikes were considered to be an expensive commodity back then and I recall saving for years to purchase a new 3-speed bike from Eaton's; in 1964 the cost was \$64. That was a major expenditure for a 12 year old! Though it wasn't particularly fashionable, my friends and I rode, at times, to our high school – Wexford Collegiate Institute. Over the course of several years, before we had driver's licences, we pedalled to our friend's cottage on Lake Scugog. During those early years of cycling, I cannot recall ever seeing a bicycle in the garbage.

It's possible that, over time, bikes have become more complex. As the actual price of bikes dropped, fewer people did their own repairs, and bike shops charged more than a bike was worth to make some repairs. As a result, old bikes (sometimes needing only minor repairs) began appearing at the curb on garbage day.

In an effort to salvage some of these bikes, Nancy discovered a charitable organization called Bikes For Humanity. This organization was entirely run by non-paid volunteers who purchased a shipping container, found a place that offered free storage, and collected 500 Do you have a bicycle that is unused and gathering dust? bikes per container. All bikes were shipped to Namibia where the bikes were distributed to the most needy. The container became a bike shop. Locals were trained to repair the bikes. Nancy and I collected bikes and when we had 15 or so we filled our trailer and headed out to the storage container off Hurontario St. in Mississauga. Unfortunately, the Toronto chapter of Bikes for Humanity lost their free storage along with many of their volunteers, so my work with them came to an end.

I have continued to collect a few bikes because I cannot pass by those at curbside. We have found an organization in Scarborough that welcomes bike donations. Scarborough Community Access has two bike repair facilities at Danforth and Victoria Park as well as Lawrence and Orton Park. The repair shops are run by volunteers and the donated bikes are repaired and given, without cost, to those who need them.



City of Toronto Climate Action Plan

Dear Neighbours,

Last month, we celebrated Earth Month with community cleanups and events across Scarborough. We had a great time with everyone, and we will be hosting our **Community Environment Day on**

May 26. We'll be handing out free bagged compost, accepting donated items for reuse and handling disposal of electronic waste and household hazardous waste products. We will share details in our e-newsletter, and you can find the full list of what you can bring online at toronto.ca/community-environment-days.

Climate Action Plan

The City has adopted an ambitious strategy to reduce community-wide greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions in Toronto to Net Zero by 2040. Toronto has been, and continues to be, a trailblazer in climate action. Communitywide emissions have decreased by 41 per cent since 1990, despite a significant growth in population and while Toronto's gross domestic product continued to rise.

The primary sources of GHG emissions in Toronto are homes and buildings (56 per cent), transportation (35 per cent), and waste (9 per cent). This year, we released a Carbon Budget, a key part of our Carbon Accountability approach. The Carbon Budget is a system to provide comprehensive information on both the effectiveness and cost of City initiatives that aim to reduce emissions across Toronto. As we continue to drive towards our ambitious 2040 GHG emissions reduction targets, the Carbon Budget helps inform better decision-making and enhances our accountability on climate action. You can learn more at toronto.ca/transformTO.

BetterHomesTO

The BetterHomesTO initiative provides homeowners with information, tools and resources to help them learn about and take on home energy retrofits. The City also offers rebates and incentives to help ease the financial burden of these changes through the Home Energy Loan Program. Its website also has information about zeroemission vehicle rebate programs. To learn more about how you can green your home and contribute to climate action, please visit betterhomesto.ca.

Waste Management Tips

Every year, the City of Toronto manages more than 900,000 tonnes (almost two billion pounds) of waste. This requires money, energy and resources and takes up valuable landfill space. Waste reduction should always be top of mind as the less waste produced, the less there is to manage. To join the waste reduction movement, reduce your environmental impact and help keep items out of landfill, check out the City of Toronto **TOwaste App**. The app has information about sorting your waste, collection schedules and where to find the closest Drop-Off Depot or donation location for reusable items.
