In essence, Guildwood Day not only celebrated a milestone anniversary but also reinforced the bonds that unite Guildwood Village as a vibrant and connected community.





Turning talk into action and dollars at Guild Park

How a new funding approach brings more benefits to more park visitors

"Actions speak louder than words" is a good phrase to remember when talk turns to Guild Park & Gardens, the landmark and increasingly popular public space in the heart of Guildwood Village.

After decades of discussions and stalled plans, a remarkable transformation is underway at this 88-acre site. Tangible improvements at Guild Park over the past 10 years include:

- restoring the historic Guild Inn and expanding it as a modern events centre
- turning an unused storage building into the multipurpose Clark Centre of the Arts
- installing new electrical power, wiring and lighting for the park's Greek Theatre
- rebuilding a damaged artist's cabin as a place to welcome park visitors
- creating a forest boardwalk so more people can enjoy nature in the park.

Funding fuelled all these features. Now it's possible to keep this revitalization on track by tapping into a significant new funding source at Guild Park.

The money now available would add to the more than \$25 million in private and public funds invested into the park

since 2015. This amount recognizes the site's significance as a former home of the historic Guild of All Arts, Canada's only Depression-era arts community founded in 1932. That inspiring place on the Scarborough Bluffs attracted artists and creators, local residents and tourists, and celebrated hotel guests, from royalty to Hollywood stars for half a century.

A series of complicated changes to the site's ownership and operations that began in 1978 resulted in a lost generation at the Guild. During this era, decision-makers allocated fewer funds to this public asset, leaving it shuttered and in shambles (see sidebar, **Dwindling Dollars Led to "Demolition by Neglect"**).

The recent turn-around began when the City of Toronto decided to convert the old Guild Inn into a money-making operation, The idea was to generate revenue to support the rest of the historic site, an approach that still applies. For decades Toronto lacked enough funds to bring the neglected building into the 21st century. By 2014, officials were negotiating with a private company to partner in the project. The City allocated about \$5 million to upgrade the site and utilities. In return, the company agreed to invest some \$15 million into the dilapidated hotel, then operate the restored and expanded building under a 40-year agreement.

Dwindling Dollars Led to "Demolition by Neglect"

Since 1978, the Guild Park has been managed through an agreement set by the Toronto & Region Conservation Authority (TRCA). Under this 95-year lease, TRCA retains ownership of the entire property, while third parties look after daily park operations.

Under this arrangement, as dollars dwindled for the site, so did visitors. So few people were coming that no records were kept of visitor numbers, although park officials continue tracking how many flowers get planted and how much grass gets cut.

The funding downtrend worsened after 1998's municipal government amalgamation. By then the expanded City of Toronto became responsible for most – but not all - of Guild Park operations. The City divided site management across more than a dozen of its divisions and departments, a practice that continues today.

From 1998 to 2015, there was lots of talk but little progress about improving the site.

• Throughout these years, City officials asked the community,

including the GVCA and other groups, for input about the Guild's future. Studies were done, surveys conducted, and a series of hotel/restaurant plans were announced. Prospective development partners included a private hotelier and an education institution. None of these projects got past the discussion phase.

- In 2008, the City began renovating the park's original Studio Building as community meeting space. The uninsured two-storey structure was destroyed by fire on Christmas Day that year. No action was taken to determine the cause of the blaze or to replace this public asset.
- In 2009, the City demolished the Guild Inn's abandoned hotel wing and meeting space in advance of a redevelopment proposal. That six-storey concrete structure was originally built in 1965 to expand Guild Inn's operations. The demolition came before the redevelopment received final City approval. Subsequent project changes didn't meet City standards and the plan was abandoned.
- In 2010, the City announced plans for an extensive "Cultural Precinct" at Guild Park which would include artists' studios, visitor facilities, a craft shop and café. The features would be housed in an existing on-site warehouse, expanded in three directions. City officials later learned that

Before construction began on the future Guild Inn Estate (GIE), City officials designated the project a "Municipal Capital Facility." This made GIE eligible for a series of long-term municipal tax and fee exemptions.

GIE's special designation is regulated by the provincial government. In return for the favoured financial benefits, the province requires GIE to provide ongoing public benefits, similar to the public services available at a typical community centre.

But delivering public benefits at Guild Park was never a priority. This became evident shortly after GIE opened for business in 2017 and later confirmed during Covid-19's hospitality restrictions. All this time, City officials encouraged the private operator to focus on booking profitable weddings, receptions and business events (see sidebar on page 10, Public Promises. Private Property.)

The City's approach was meant to maximize future revenue from GIE's operations. It prioritized financial returns to the municipality ahead of public benefits.

After seven years of seeing GIE serve private clients, rather than the public, people are beginning to demand something in return. Especially knowing that through the City's 40-year operating agreement, GIE receives about \$200,000 in municipal tax exemptions annually.

"This facility brings nothing to the community" is how one Guildwood Village resident summed up the situation on social media earlier this year.

the park's environmental constraints prevented the precinct project from going ahead. Five years later, park volunteers suggested redesigning the same warehouse as an arts facility by adding a new third level. This idea inspired Guild Park's Clark Centre for the Arts, which opened in 2022.

Back in 2010, Guild Park lacked plans and funding. The neglected site was full of ruins. By intention, the grounds displayed dozens of fragments salvaged from now-destroyed historic buildings. Due lack of attention, the site's once-popular hotel was left partly demolished and boarded up.

The National Trust for Canada listed the abandoned Guild Inn on its Top 10 list of most endangered historic sites in 2011. The charitable organization told Canadians that the building was "in imminent danger of demolition by neglect... [and] caught up in complicated negotiations involving multiple levels of authority."

As long as Guild Park was without major projects, it was without major funding and without much future.

Another public comment was more blunt:

"This is a travesty for Guildwood Village. Promises made to the community during the renovation of this building have never materialized. Many visitors and community members use this park and yet cannot sit and have a bite to eat. Politicians and City officials ... refuse to even negotiate with community members to resolve this issue. Having been a resident in this area I know how much we were all looking forward to this restaurant."

While people are still waiting for GIE and the City to deliver public benefits at the former Guild Inn site, Guild Park itself has improved. The influx of GIE's private investment was a catalyst for the City of Toronto to begin funding major improvements to the entire property. In addition to the City spending \$5 million to upgrade on-site services near the original hotel, City budgets funded:

- the park's Clark Centre
- upgraded lights and power for the Greek Theatre
- reopening the Sculptor's Cabin
- a two-section forest boardwalk, including a formal entrance.

Toronto Parks, Foresty & Recreation (PFR) invested in three major strategic plans that identified priorities for



Guild Park's trails, gardens and overall management. As more money went to restore, reopen and reimagine the neglected site, Guild Park began attracting more visitors. Attendance jumped when GIE opened its doors in 2017 for private events, weddings and corporate functions.

As the shutters came off other on-site facilities, Guild Park was no longer shunned by City-supported and community-run programs. Events like Doors Open, Arts in the Parks, Heritage Toronto tours and Jane's Walks brought increased park visitors. So did the annual Guild Alive With Culture Arts Festival and Guild Festival Theatre's summertime season of award-winning, professional productions.

After Canada-wide closures of COVID-19 ended, Guild Park attendance rebounded to record numbers. People came to this unique setting on the Scarborough Bluffs to enjoy nature, art, live performances, community activities, plus a steady stream of private events and parties. Last year some 200,000 people came to Guild Park, an estimated 300% increase from 2014, when none of the buildings on-site were operating and the park supported few attractions.

But funding for Guild Park isn't keeping pace with this increased popularity. More visitors are bringing more demands for better facilities. Many of these improvements were identified as priority projects in PFR's three long-term plans for Guild Park from 2014 and 2018. Yet PFR lacks funding to make progress. Despite public requests for improvements and PFR's backlog of recommendations, the past two City budgets included no new PFR funding

for Guild Park projects (see sidebar on page 11, **More park** use, more park cuts).

This creates a growing gap between the rising cost for park improvements and shrinking amounts available for parks. These same factors led to 'demolition by neglect' conditions at Guild Park more than a decade ago. It also means Guild Park is part of a disturbing national trend.

The 2022 Canadian City Park Report by Park People, an organization focused on municipal park issues, found that parks departments at 86% of Canadian cities surveyed have "insufficient operating budgets" and that these park budgets are "perennially strained."

A remedy for this chronic lack of money for park improvements, according to Park People, is encouraging city officials to collaborate with community/park groups and together develop innovative new funding approaches for their parks.

An opportunity now exists at Guild Park for such a collaboration. It involves directing a new source of money from the site to improve the park and deliver public benefits for everyone who visits. City officials confirmed last year that GIE would begin paying annual rent to the City, For the first time since the Guild Inn closed in 2001, the park is generating ongoing revenue. Under terms of its operating agreement, the City expects to receive about \$600,000 in rent for 2023. This amount is based on the more than \$6 million in annual revenue that GIE earned from its wedding/private event bookings at Guild Park. Given the increasing popularity of both Guild Park and

Public Promises. Private Property

People representing the City of Toronto and Guild Inn Estate have made many promises about future public benefits from the private events centre at Guild Park.

Talk started in 2015, when officials began announcing and signing written agreements about GIE meeting its obligations as a taxpayer-subsidized "municipal capital facility," Public benefits identified included features such as:

- a "first class restaurant"
- offering community meeting space at the City's discounted rates
- City-run recreation programs.

None are available to the public as of mid-2024.

Rather than take remedial action, officials talk about why public benefits aren't possible to provide at Guild Park. To summarize their past responses:

• Issue: No Public Restaurant. Reason: After providing limited food service to park visitors and the public, GIE convinced City officials that a restaurant on the premises was unprofitable. The City decided to drop the restaurant requirement in GIE's operating agreement. Meanwhile,

the facility operator continues to provide on-site licensed catering services to its private clients.

- Issue: No Community Meeting Space: Reason: City parks officials decided they couldn't incorporate GIE facilities with the City's system for booking community space. Instead, GIE uses its own commercial rates for all meeting space requests. The rental policies and discounted rates available at City community centres don't apply at Guild Park.
- Issue: No City Recreation Programs: Reason: City recreation staff announced that a public yoga program would begin at GIE in 2024. In April, recreation staff cancelled the program after receiving just two advance registrations. No other recreation programs have been scheduled for the premises.

Given all this talk, one action is visible to everyone who walks by the beautifully restored GIE building: Having permanent signs posted outside the facility that read, "Private Property no public access".

These metal signs discourage regular park visitors and passers-by from entering the building. The result is Guild Park is home to one of the few, if not only, tax-supported municipal capital facilities in Ontario where the public isn't welcome.

GIE's operations, the City is looking ahead to keep earning more rent in years to come.

Volunteers from local community and park organizations propose a simple way for the City to use this rental revenue: Allocate the funds generated at Guild Park for Guild Park improvements. This approach aligns with the City's mandate to have its public real estate assets support public programs and City initiatives. Applying revenue from private businesses to improve public features is also a long-standing practice of City officials. It was the idea behind partnering with GIE in 2015. Directing park funds for park projects makes Guild Park more financially self-sufficient, without adding to the City of Toronto's financial burden. As more private clients use GIE's facilities, more money is available to improve the park and deliver long-needed public benefits on-site.

This will create long-term funding for the dozens of projects that park officials have already identified for this Scarborough park but have been delayed for decades due to insufficient budgets. These include:

- · building more washrooms
- improving the Greek Theatre
- creating better trails with more signs
- restoring the outdoor public art collection
- adding horticulture features
- implementing some of the many recommendations from Guild Park's three strategic plans .

Volunteers have raised this approach with Toronto Mayor Olivia Chow, Deputy Mayor Jennifer McKelvie, local City

Councillor Paul Ainslie, officials from many of the City departments responsible for site operations and other Guild Park stakeholders. Friends of Guild Park, the GVCA and Park People support this idea. A feasibility report by a senior City director into this approach was expected in April but remains outstanding. Other reactions range from strong interest to initial uncertainty. This indicates the value in pursuing this concept further as a collaborative project.

Since actions are worth more than words, the next step suggested by Friends of Guild Park is setting up a working group to design and implement such a funding model for Guild Park. The aim is to create a pilot project that addresses current conditions, the many interests at stake and the complex issues involved. It calls for a team with the motivation, skills and experience to turn an innovative idea into reality. The pilot project will require a realistic timeframe, so a five-year mandate is suggested for this initiative. It also requires widespread support if it is to bring about lasting park improvements and public benefits.

Turning all this past talk into action and dollars will ensure that Guild Park operates at its full potential as a unique City asset and as an inspiring public destination where art meets nature.

More park use, more park cuts

Despite more people coming to Guild Park, fewer people are caring for the grounds and gardens. Cutbacks in PFR's operating budget for 2024 forced reducing Guild Park's seasonal groundskeeping crew by 25%. Current conditions at the Greek Theatre give a dramatic example of coping with limited park resources. Guild Festival Theatre (GFT) began producing live professional performances at this outdoor stage in 2011. While the venue looks spectacular to ever-increasing audiences, it continues to lack basic theatrical equipment, despite a recent electrical upgrade.

Behind the theatre's eight white marble columns exists a black hole, not a backstage. GFT's cast and crew must carry or cart in virtually everything required for every show, for every production - from designer sets, to sound mixing desks, to dressing rooms. Considering these challenges, many entertainers and event producers simply choose to bypass Guild Park and perform at better-equipped venues.

The keystone figure sculpted above each stage archway is a reminder of the Herculean efforts required to mount performances there. It makes the two Dora Awards that GFT won for its 2022 season – including the Audience Choice Award from its growing number of fans - a truly amazing

achievement. Despite the accolades and audiences, City officials stated in 2024 that Guild Park and its stage were too small to justify providing new facilities to make the Greek Theatre comparable to what the City supplies for stages in other City parks, such as the High Park amphitheatre.

Limited funding also means limited park infrastructure and services. A common question asked by the increasing number of Torontonians visiting Guild Park is why isn't this site comparable to the City's newer parks? Public washrooms are top of mind. The parks department operates the same two "universal" public washrooms on-site as in 2018. That year, before the post-COVID surge in park use, PFR identified having more washrooms at Guild Park as a "high priority." This is clear every time the park hosts popular outdoor performances on summer evenings. Crowds of hundreds of people come for the shows but can't always find a place to go. PFR was moving ahead on a new on-site washroom project, but City Finance cancelled the work in 2023 due to budget constraints. The project is scheduled to start again in 2028, or later. Even with Guild Park's temporary trailer toilets and the washrooms available during daytime hours at the Clark Centre, the site will continue to seriously under-serve park visitors for the next four years, or until more funding becomes available.

Guildwood's Greek Theatre is now a hub of culture and creativity mainly due to the seeds of inspiration that were planted years ago. And thanks to dedicated people giving what they can to water those seeds, GFT is thriving as a multifaceted festival and award-winning company that is the pride of Guildwood.

Geocaching in Guildwood

In 2011, a Guildwood neighbour introduced me to a whole new world called "geocaching". She told me there was something called a "geocache", that it had been placed by another neighbour, and it was hidden along one of the trails right here in Guildwood. She took me to the area where it was

hidden, and told me to look for a little metal tube. I hunted for about twenty minutes, but even knowing right where it was supposed to be, I had to admit defeat. Finally, she pulled an inconspicuous branch out of a little hole in the tree, and there on the end of it—oh my goodness!— was a thumb-sized bison tube. Inside was a rolled-up piece of paper. I was amazed. And I was excited to learn there were lots, lots more little hidden containers waiting for me to find.



Geocaching is a real-world treasure hunt, played using an app on your phone, or with a GPS device. Geocaches, or caches for short, come in all shapes and sizes, as big as a shoebox (or bigger!) or as small as a pencil top eraser. Inside each cache is a logbook you must sign with your cacher name, as proof you found it. That rolled-up piece

of paper I found inside the bison tube was the logbook! The larger ones sometimes contain little trinkets which you can take as a souvenir, though the courteous thing to do is replace the trinket with an equally nice one for the next cacher to find.



To find a geocache, you need to create a free account at geocaching.com or on the geocaching app. There's also a "premium" version which will give you access to more caches. Both the website and the app have a map that will show you the locations of geocaches near you, or anywhere in the world you might want to go. The website has links to several helpful tutorials. While

many geocaches are wheelchair or stroller accessible, there are others that might require you to do things like climb a tree or crawl into a tunnel! Each cache listing on the app will tell you how difficult it is to find, how rough the terrain is, and how large (or small) the container you're looking for will be. After you choose one to find, the app or GPS device will navigate you towards the geocache.

I admit, when I first started I didn't understand how finding these geocaches could possibly be any kind of challenge, if you're given the exact coordinates. But several "DNF"s (Did Not Find) later, I realized how wrong I was. Geocaches are tricky to spot! They have to be well hidden so they won't be accidentally found by non-cachers who, not knowing their



purpose, might move or even remove them. With good camouflage, even a container in plain sight can be tough to see. Each one is different. Also, the GPS signal can only guide you to within about 5 metres of Ground Zero at best, and some areas, such as the downtown core, are notorious for having bouncy signals from those GPS satellites. Once you've found a few caches, you start to



develop a "geosense" of where the likely hiding spots are. The hunt is part of the fun!

There is also a category of geocaches called virtuals (Earthcaches, Ghost Caches, and Adventure Labs are the most popular types), where there is no hidden container to find or logbook to sign. Instead, the goal is to learn something about the location. In our

neighbourhood there's an Adventure Lab that will guide you through, and provide information, on some of the structures in Guild Park, and a Ghost Cache that will tell you all about, and show you where to find, the wreck of The Alexandria. There are also Puzzle Caches, which require you to solve a puzzle or crack a code in order to unlock the correct coordinates before you can find the cache.



Geocaching is a great way to get outside and explore. Parks and trails are popular places to hide a geocache. I've discovered so many neat little walking trails and out-of-the-way parks, looking for geocaches. They're also often located near points of interest: unusual, historic, or



scenic areas. The cache's info page can be a mini history lesson. I learned a lot about this city through geocaching! For example, do you know what the secret message in the brickwork of Toronto's Old City Hall says? There's a geocache that will lead you there and tell you how to read it. Do you know

the story of the Finch Ave E. Bailey Bridge? There's a geocache that will tell you about it. And for bibliophiles, there's a geocache hidden close to almost every branch of the Toronto Public Library, including our little one in Guildwood.

I love to go geocaching while on vacation, too. Wherever I am, I make sure to check the area for caches that have been given a lot of favourite points, because they'll always be worth the visit. Geocaches have led me to amazing lookout points, hidden petroglyphs, and the ruins of a castle—the sorts of places locals may know about, but probably won't appear in travel guidebooks. The app will

keep track of how many geocaches you've found, and how many different countries you've found them in.

Right now there are more than three million geocaches hidden all around the world, on all seven continents. There are almost 1500 in Toronto, and ten of those are right here in Guildwood. These numbers change all the time as older caches are archived and new



ones are added by people who enjoy the game enough to hide some of their own. That clever bison tube geocache I first found was archived long ago, but another one of my first finds, hidden in Guild Park by a local Sparks troop in 2007, is still there. If you think you'd enjoy the challenge of hunting for caches in this surprisingly large world of hidden things, I hope you'll give geocaching a try. Be sure to be stealthy, put the cache back exactly as you found it, and remember to bring a pen to sign the log!



Addressing the Challenge of Graffiti: Vandalism in Scarborough's Guildwood Area

Scarborough Guildwood has been met with a persistent challenge: graffiti vandalism. While the neighbourhood boasts scenic beauty and historical significance, the proliferation of unauthorized graffiti tags on public and private property has become a cause for concern among residents and Toronto Police.

Graffiti vandalism, characterized by

unauthorized markings, has long been contentious in communities in the Toronto area. In Guildwood, this vandalism poses both aesthetic concerns and safety and security risks, detracting from the neighbourhood's appeal and well-being.

Despite efforts to combat graffiti vandalism through enforcement and deterrence measures, perpetrators deface property with impunity. Graffiti tagging, often under the cover of darkness, makes it challenging for the Police to apprehend and hold offenders accountable for their actions.

Like many of us, Scarborough for me has a special place in my heart. I not only grew up here but have not held a job outside of the Scarborough area for over three decades. Show me a place with more waterfront or scenic parks anywhere. I argue that you would not be able to.

So I wrote this article to you just as frustrated as you are. If you see anyone vandalizing anything in your area, do not hesitate to report it to the Police. This crime is unacceptable.


Community engagement plays a crucial role in combating graffiti vandalism in Guildwood. By fostering a sense of ownership and pride among residents, community members can become proactive stewards of their neighbourhood, reporting vandalism promptly and advocating for preventative measures. Neighbourhood watch programs, graffiti removal initiatives, and collaboration with the Toronto Police Auxiliary program are a great way to start.

Furthermore, educational outreach and youth engagement programs can empower young people to channel their creative energy productively. Guildwood can cultivate a culture of respect for public spaces and discourage destructive behaviour.

In addition to community-led efforts, a collaboration between local counsellors, law enforcement, and property owners is essential in addressing graffiti vandalism effectively. Keeping Students Engaged in School

I am proud that our government introduced a suite of reforms over these past six months to ensure that our students are learning the skills of the future, embracing a back to basics curriculum in the classroom. This includes:

- Ontario's first financial literacy graduation requirement,
- reintroducing a modernized "Home Ec" course which includes nutritious cooking, changing a tire, sewing a button, using first aid, career prep, and more,
- revitalizing guidance and career education, and
- providing up to \$14 million in new funding in 2024-25 to launch new career coaching for Grade 9 and 10 students and to explore new pathways into STEM and skilled trades.

We are also restricting the use of cellphones and reinforcing the ban on vaping in our schools.

Cracking Down on Impaired Driving and Auto Theft

We have seen too many families in Ontario who have had their lives torn apart by the careless and shameful actions of impaired drivers, which is why our government has introduced legislation that, if passed, would impose stiffer penalties for those who drive under the influence of alcohol and drugs. This includes:

- requiring those convicted of impaired driving to install an ignition interlock device in their vehicle and undergo mandatory remedial education and treatment for first and second-time alcohol and drug related offences, respectively,
- imposing a lifetime license suspension for those convicted of impaired driving causing death,
- increasing immediate roadside license suspensions for first and second-time alcohol and drug-related offenses,
- providing additional tools and training to help police officers detect drug-impaired driving and launch a provincewide campaign to highlight the dangers, with a focus on cannabis and young drivers.

I know how concerned the community has been as auto thefts and carjackings are on the rise across Ontario, which is why our government continues to take steps in order to crack down on auto theft by suspending driver's licenses for people convicted of the crime. This is just one additional step in our plan to help deter potential thieves and make it more challenging for criminals to reoffend. Last year, our government invested \$51 million to help police identify and dismantle organized crime networks and put thieves behind bars.

Reducing Wait Times for MRI and CT Scans

As many of you know, our government has been committed to reducing wait times for surgeries and procedures. We are no longer accepting the status quo, which is why we are taking the next step in our plan by adding 100,000 more MRI and CT scans at community surgical and diagnostic centres across the province each year.

This expansion of service will help reduce wait times for MRI and CT scans to 28 days in every region of the province, ensuring every person who needs imaging receives it within the medically recommended period of time.

Traffic Calming Request for Hill Crescent from Markham Road to Bethune Boulevard

Traffic Operations have revisited this request and reviewed the data collected for speed calming requests against the updated Traffic Calming Policy. All eligibility and warrant criteria as outlined in the updated Traffic Calming Policy has been met except for one. Therefore, staff recommends the installation of speed humps. Staff will present a report recommending these installations to Scarborough Community Council on July 12th.

Request for an Advanced Left turn signal at Kingston Road and Guildwood Parkway

Residents have contacted my office requesting an advanced left turn signal for westbound drivers on Kingston Road turning left onto Guildwood Parkway. Transportation Services staff evaluated and found the request warranted for both AM and PM peak periods. This installation is anticipated to be completed by the end of June.

A skate spot is coming to Elizabeth Simcoe Park! A community consultation survey is anticipated to launch online this fall. City of Toronto Climate Action Plan

Dear Neighbours,

It was great to see so many of you this summer at community events including the 50th Guildwood Day in June. Thank you to all the community volunteers that put on this great event. I enjoyed joining

you for the parade and look forward to next year.

On September 28, I will be hosting the second annual Harvest Fest at the Port Union Community Centre from 11:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. We will have a vendor and farmers' market, family-friendly activities, and a community barbecue hosted by 416. I hope to see you there.

Micromobility Strategy

In May, City Council voted to opt into a pilot project allowing low-speed vehicles on select streets.

Low-speed vehicles are four-wheeled cars or trucks that are smaller and lighter than regular cars and have a maximum speed of 40 kilometres per hour.

Under provincial law, low-speed vehicles are only allowed on roads with a maximum speed limit of 50 kilometers per hour. A license, vehicle registration and insurance are required to operate a low-speed vehicle.

Toronto Police Services and City Staff are launching an educational campaign to increase public awareness of key safety issues related to the use of low-speed vehicles, including which vehicles are permitted and where they can be operated and parked.

Allowing low-speed vehicles introduces alternatives to emission-generating vehicles to help the City reach its goal of net zero emissions by 2040.

Parking Fines Update

City Staff recommended increasing fines for safety and non-safety parking offences to increase compliance with the rules of the road and align with fines in other jurisdictions, effective August 1.

At Council, I worked with my colleagues to ensure that the fines related to the non-safety related offences will only increase by the rate of inflation, resulting in a lower increase than had originally been proposed. This includes offences such as forgetting to pay the parking meter, parking longer than 3 hours on-street, or parking overnight without a permit

Safety-related offences include those that could seriously impact the safety of road users and will see a higher increase. For example, the fine for parking in a bike lane will be \$200, an increase from \$150. Other offences that will have larger

increases include stopping close to an intersection or stopping too close to a school crossing.

I'm also continuing to advocate for increasing the fines for making an improper stop in an intersection. When cars "block the box" they create congestion and create safety concerns for pedestrians and cyclists. City Council voted in favour of my request that the province amend the Highway Traffic Act to update the fines.

311 At Your Service

311 connects clients to non-emergency City services, programs and information.

The service can be accessed 24/7 by calling 311, visiting toronto.ca/311 or using the 311 Toronto mobile app. You can use 311 to create service requests for animal control, bylaw violations, property standards, graffiti, missed solid waste pickup, tree pruning requests or to report litter and illegal dumping. Potholes can also be reported to 311.

When submitting a service request, provide as much information as possible including location, description, photos and your contact information.

You will receive a reference number. Please record it so your request can be tracked. This number allows you to check the status of, and edit or cancel, your request. If your request has not been handled in an appropriate time frame, please follow up with my office.
