As we approach the end of 2020, we can all agree that this has been no ordinary year. Guildwood has missed out on so many of our community traditions: no GVCA door-to-door membership drive, no garage sale day, no Guildwood Day and BBQ. Each of our public schools have had to cancel their great events too. These events are important to maintaining our sense of community and we will certainly look forward to getting back to normal as soon as we safely can.

We all miss the joy of large gatherings of family and friends. While in some cases people are finding innovative ways to hold events safely, many of us have missed or have had to postpone important life events, vacations, graduations, weddings, family reunions, funerals and more.

As I write this piece, the second wave is now upon us in Toronto and the resulting return to stage 2 restrictions will continue to play on our anxieties. As the pandemic continues, greater focus is being placed on mental health issues that follow from reduced social interaction. It is important to recognize these are very real challenges.

Recognizing the need to support residents, the City has developed specific supports available through their website <https://www.toronto.ca/home/covid-19/>. The links there provide access to an extended range of coping and mental health supports. All are free and many are text-based self-help tools. The first topic-specific page starts with a short piece reassuring us that in times like these “it’s OK not to feel OK” and that “many people may feel sad, stressed, anxious, confused, scared or angry during the COVID-19 pandemic. These are normal and common responses to unexpected or stressful situations.”

In addition, the City provides timely and fact-based updates on the pandemic through our City Councillors, so if you haven’t already done so, please sign up to get regular COVID-19 updates from Councillor Ainslie or Councillor McKelvie.

I hope everyone is doing well and staying healthy. I want to thank everyone for your efforts during this very difficult time. It is very important for all of us to the best of our ability to follow the mandatory physical distancing bylaw and the new mandatory mask or face covering bylaw!

As the virus continues to circulate in the community, it is vital that we are all reminded to adhere to Toronto Public Health's advice to practice physical distancing, wash hands often and wear a mask or face covering where mandatory or when physical distancing cannot be maintained. Toronto Public Health also encourages residents to download the COVID Alert app, which can help notify individuals who are exposed to COVID-19 in the community.

As part of the new initiative #ShowLoveTO – BigArtTO brings illuminated art to life.

Explore artwork across the city! Experience art illuminated at BigArtTO, a city-wide public art celebration featuring free access to over 200 hours of temporary public artworks projected onto local buildings and landmarks. Created by Toronto artists, the projections will play in each of Toronto's Wards. Ward 24 – Scarborough-Guildwood is on November 25–28, 2020, 6–9 p.m. at Meadowglen Place, 2 Meadowglen Pl. South Wall (can be seen from Markham Road).

**Community Updates:**

**Guildwood Parkway at Prince Philip Boulevard.** I have asked our Transportation Services staff to review the turn on Guildwood Parkway descending from Kingston Road towards Prince Philip Boulevard as there are too many motor vehicle accidents taking place along this stretch of roadway. Damage to the guardrails along Guildwood Parkway occurred due to a vehicle accident which took place last month. Repairs have been made to the guard rails and a new 20km/hr speed limit sign has been installed. I would like to remind everyone to drive safe and be cautious of your surroundings.

**Pedestrian crosswalk at Dearham Wood & Schubert Drive** was completed and activated in August 2020.

**Traffic control signal at Morningside Avenue and Cumber/Fordover** is currently being designed and tendered. Construction for this project is scheduled in 2021.

**Toronto Hydro has completed a lighting assessment for Catalina Drive** and has discovered this area needs new lighting. This has been issued for construction and new lights are being added.

**Toronto Hydro is planning to rebuild and relocate the overhead and underground electrical systems in this area:** Greenvale Terrace (North), Galloway Road (East), Scarborough Golf Club Road (West), and Westlake Road (South). This is a customer connection project that just began; the forecasted completion time in October 2020.

**TRCA staff started removing 46 trees**, all under 10cm in size, along the TRCA access road at 241 Galloway. All tree clearing and tree pruning works to facilitate the user access and garbage collection started this summer by TRCA. Urban Forestry Renewal will complete compensation plantings at a nearby location after, which will meet or exceed compensation requirements.

**The Rotary Club of Scarborough is presenting The Rotary Tree of Remembrance** at the Church of the Holy Trinity, Guildwood from Dec. 11–24, 2020 on the front lawn. Yellow remembrance ribbons will be available locally in Guildwood by Rotarians. The Remembrance ribbons represent your personalized names and messages honouring the loss of loved ones, remembering loved ones unable to be with us this year and giving thanks to special frontline workers who have shown great dedication during COVID-19. # ***Guildwood Physiotherapy***


## **Post Surgical Recovery**

After discharge from hospital, many patients should be referred to a rehabilitation hospital or clinic to regain strength and return to independent functioning. It is very important that Physiotherapy begin as soon as possible after surgery to ensure a prompt recovery.

In our clinic we see patients after various types of orthopaedic surgeries, such as Rotator Cuff tears, Anterior Cruciate Ligament repairs, total and partial knee and hip replacements, back, foot, and hand surgeries, etc. Appointments are usually available in a day or two.

Our Physiotherapists follow standard treatment protocols or work closely with the surgeon's specific protocol for recovery. Passive exercises and gentle mobilization techniques are used first, and exercises are later introduced to gradually strengthen and return full function.

The exercise program is gradually increased based on the healing time of that particular surgery. We find that using modalities such as laser, ultrasound and Electro-Accuscope help to heal and repair the wound faster with less pain. Our treatments typically last from 45 minutes to 1-1/2 hours, depending on the condition being treated.

## Local Guildwood Residents Thank Frontline Workers

After Guildwood resident Don Briggs heard about an initiative in Ajax to thank the staff at a long-term care facility by providing a nice Italian dinner, he related this story to a few of his neighbours. One of them, Cam Sambourne, decided that something similar should be done in Guildwood—not only for staff at Guildwood Extendicare, but also the staff at Valu-mart.

As an essential service, Valu-mart has implemented many COVID-19 precautionary measures. The cashiers, stock personnel and administrative workers have continued to work, and are at much greater risk than those of us who have stayed at home.

Guildwood Extendicare has been hit hard by COVID-19. By early July,

the facility had suffered 48 resident deaths and many more cases of COVID-19 among residents and staff. This situation has made it very stressful for the doctors, nurses, PSWs and the rest of the employees to walk through those doors every day.

Cam got several Guildwood neighbours to each throw a few dollars into the pot. Then they convinced more to do the same. In no time they had raised enough money to buy a \$10 Tim Hortons gift card for each of Valu-mart's 57 employees, and to supply Extendicare with several urns of Tim Hortons coffee along with a few dozen donuts, Timbits and pastries. Jyothi Jame, supervisor at Tim's in the plaza, kindly donated additional coffee and donuts as well.

The items were delivered to both facilities on Saturday, May 16, and both were thrilled to receive the cards and the goodies. More importantly, they were ecstatic to realize that their efforts and sacrifices had been recognized. Cam, and those who contributed, figured it was a small token of appreciation for the necessary services these people have been providing to the Guildwood community during this difficult time.

COVID-19 could be with us for a while yet. We can never say thank you to these frontliners enough. There have been many acts of kindness by Guildwood residents. Don and Cam hope that this story will inspire even more.

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# Guild Park's Highlights from 2020 ... and Challenges Ahead

This was a year like no other at Guild Park & Gardens.

While COVID-19 disrupted so many activities at Guild Park, the site continued to attract thousands of visitors throughout 2020 – from local residents who regularly enjoy the park's spectacular 88 acres, to first-time visitors looking to escape the confines of the pandemic.

Everyone who arrives is inspired by the park's unique combination of nature and artistic features – beautiful autumn colours in the woods, historic architectural artifacts in the gardens.

In 2020, many Guild Park events faced COVID-caused cancellations, most notably the GVCA's annual Guildwood Day BBQ; the annual Guild Alive with Culture arts festival, organized by local City Councillor Paul Ainslie and the Guild Renaissance Group; and all public tours/activities held by Friends of Guild Park.

Despite these disappointments, Guild Park's revitalization and improvements kept moving ahead, along with new challenges emerging as more and more people visited.

Below is a summary of this year's park highlights – and items that require attention. This information comes from the 2020 Annual General Meeting held recently by Friends of Guild Park. ## **Virtual Guild Park Tours**

In place of the popular public walking tours hosted by Friends of Guild Park, this summer our volunteers created a series of virtual tours about Guild Park's natural features.

These online tours feature Guild Park's shoreline, the importance of waterfront cleanups, bio-diversity, and how nature is depicted by the art and architecture on-site. This program was part of a national program organized through the charitable organization Park People and TD Bank. These videos have now reached more than 7,000 people – a much wider audience than how many people actually go on these park walks.

## **Live Theatre Returns**

Kudos to Guild Festival Theatre (GFT) for presenting a limited number of public performances this summer at Guild Park's historic Greek Theatre. GFT's efforts ensured that live stage shows continued at Guild Park in spite of COVID-19.

A limited number of audience members – all suitably physically distanced – enjoyed cabaret-style shows of song and dance. The excerpts gave a taste of what's ahead for GFT's 2021 season, with full productions of Alice in Wonderland and Salt Water Moon.

Earlier this summer, when the Greek Theatre was unavailable for public use, GFT organized a series of "Porch Performances." This brought live theatre directly to Guildwood Village residents. ## **Arts In (and Near) the Park**

The show also went on for a pair of performers originally scheduled for the Greek Theatre by the City of Toronto-sponsored Arts In the Parks program.

After public activities got cancelled at all public parks, both groups took different approaches to bringing music and fun to Guildwood Village: one group hit the airwaves, the other took to streets.

Japanese drummers from Nagata Shachu went online in June to present a virtual workshop and performance. Local residents had the chance to try their hand at taiko rhythms via computer, smartphone or tablets.

In August, Driftwood Theatre brought stilt-walkers, musicians and flag-wavers to a special one-night-only parade along Somerdale Square. The performance was about neighbourhood spirit, and the performers made their point by using the Guildwood Village flag.

### **Construction Continues at the Clark Centre**

Major work to create the Clark Centre for the Arts is expected to finish by year-end. The three-storey facility will include:

- » studios for professional and emerging artists;
- » space for public art programs;
- » plus rooms for exhibitions and other arts events.

COVID-19 restrictions delayed construction on the \$5.4 million project. Recently, the building's exterior was completed with all doors and windows in place. In the new year, extensive interior work gets underway so the building can open later in 2021.

The Clark Centre is named after Rosa and Spencer Clark, the philanthropists who founded the historic Guild of All Arts on the site in 1932. The couple operated the grounds and the Guild Inn for almost 50 years. This facility will be operated by the City of Toronto's department of Economic Development and Culture (EDC). It marks the return of the arts and artists to the site after a 25-year absence.

### **New Architecture Display**

Guild Park visitors will soon see three hand-carved stone crests back on public view.

These marble keystones graced the façade of the now-demolished Bank of Toronto. It's the same building whose columns and arches were saved by Spencer Clark, then redesigned to create the Greek Theatre.

The crests depict "Enterprise", "Agriculture" and the City of Toronto's original Coat of Arms. They represent the "pillars" of the bank when it opened its headquarters in the city's downtown in 1914. Fittingly, these crests will be displayed near the Greek Theatre.

Mounting these crests is a project of EDC. The initiative is part of ongoing work to return to Guild Park more building artifacts from what was known as the "Spencer Clark Collection of Historic Architecture."

### **Historic Plaque for Guild of All Arts**

After four years of volunteer effort, Guild Park welcomed its first official heritage plaque earlier this year. Details about this Heritage Toronto marker were included in the Summer 2020 edition of News & Views. Watch for information about a public celebration next year to mark this milestone for Guild Park, Guildwood Village and the City of Toronto.

### **Volunteer Clean-Up**

Thanks to the many local residents who took time in September to pick up litter throughout Guild Park, as part of the Guildwood Village Community Clean-up.

This effort is augmented by the year-round cleanup activities organized by Friends of Guild Park volunteer, Rose Mitchell Spohn.

Based on Rose's ongoing "trash stats", a new story is emerging from the garbage being left along Guild Park's waterfront and adjacent Waterfront Trail area.

Comparing the types and amount of litter collected in 2019 to the first nine months of 2020, it's clear that more trash is being left behind by people using the shoreline for picnics and gatherings.

For example:

- » Cups/plates: 66% more, based on 251 collected in 2019; 418 collected Jan-Sept 2020
- » Beverage containers: 39% more, based on 966 (2019); 1,345 (so far 2020)
- » Plastic/paper bags: 32% more, based on 99 (2019); 149 (so far 2020)
- » Food wrapping: 24% more, based on 658 (2019); 817 (so far 2020)

As a result of these and other stats from clean-up, Guild Park officials decided to install more garbage/recycling bins along the Waterfront Trail.

### **Ongoing Park Challenges**

#### **Park Vandalism**

Guild Park suffered three notable cases of willful damage by vandals of the summer. This appears part of a City-wide trend. With organized park events cancelled, more people came to city parks on their own, often when park staff and/or volunteers weren't on-site.

At Guild Park, without watchful eyes tending the grounds, leading tours or similar activities, the site became increasingly vulnerable to damage and graffiti.

One early morning in June, someone lit two separate fires – one on the stage of the Greek Theatre, the other around the installation of four “Provincial Panels.” These park features were left darkened by smoke. There was also graffiti and

damage to the cement floor of the theatre.

In early August, someone used black magic marker to deface two white marble panels on the Greek Theatre.

In mid-August, another deliberate fire destroyed two of Guild Park’s plastic trash/recycling bins. This happened just weeks after the City of Toronto installed new trash and recycling bins along Guild Park’s waterfront trail.

**Community Use of Clark Architecture Collection**

Dozens of stoneworks collected by Spencer Clark from now-demolished buildings are looking for new homes.

The City of Toronto is custodian of these architectural features. City officials are keeping the façade fragments and artifacts that have historic value. The remaining pieces – many of which are duplicates of stone displayed at Guild Park – are now considered surplus and will be available for use in other locations.

Guildwood’s Church of the Holy Trinity and Friends of Guildwood Village Park have already expressed initial interest in re-using some of these unique stones.

Another group interested is the residents’ association in the Grange community, whose members live near the Art Gallery of Ontario (AGO). The Grange group has already drafted plans to use a number of the surplus stones as markers for a new linear park in downtown Toronto.

This park links two sites that have connections with Spencer Clark and

his wife Rosa. The park’s northern boundary is the AGO’s Grange Park. The Clarks were long-time patrons of the AGO. The new park’s southern boundary is Campbell House Museum (at Queen and University) which already has some of the Clark architectural pieces on display.

Guildwood Village residents also have an opportunity to retain some of these architectural artifacts at local sites, outside Guild Park. This initiative requires a small group of local volunteers to get involved. This is a planning project that would be of special interest to those with expertise in design, construction and/or history.

With enough local residents showing interest, this would ensure that tangible pieces of history linked to Spencer and Rosa Clark get displayed permanently throughout Guildwood Village. For more information, please contact John Mason at [president@guildpark.ca](mailto:president@guildpark.ca).

The good news is that people at Guild Park notified City officials promptly about the damage. Smoke and graffiti were successfully removed from the damaged architectural pieces. The waste bins were replaced.

The bad news is these incidents highlight that Guild Park lacks any protective measures to guard against such damage or to identify those responsible.

**Public Facilities**

Guild Park currently operates with two public permanent washrooms. Also on site is a seasonal washroom trailer. It operates from May through October and provides seven additional facilities.

The number of permanent, all-weather public washrooms is less than adequate for a destination public park that in 2018 attracted more than 70,000 visitors.

To make matters worse, the park’s permanent washrooms were closed for repairs most of last winter, due to vandalism and/or water leakage damage. Park visitors had to use outdoor portable toilets during the winter months. It is unclear if these issues have been resolved heading into the 2020-21 winter season.

**Signage**

Warning and danger signs are common throughout Guild Park. Lacking are signs giving information about the fascinating legacy of Guild Park and the hundreds of features visitors can find throughout the site.

Providing basic park information, such as directions, distances and descriptions, are among the recommendations of three major plans covering Guild Park and its future (see next section).

With the exception of the volunteer-funded Heritage Toronto plaque and temporary signs posted in Guild Park’s two notice boards, there’s no easy way for visitors to learn about Guild Park while on-site.

**Guild Park Plans**

Since 2014, the City of Toronto’s Parks, Forestry & Recreation (PFR) has completed three major planning documents covering:

- » Park Management
- » Park Trails
- » Park Gardens

Each plan benefited from input by top professionals and by local residents and Guild Park supporters – people who regularly visit the site and use its facilities. Each plan contains a series of long-term recommendations designed to revitalize Guild Park. The aim is for Guild Park to operate at its full potential as a destination park serving local, provincial, national and international visitors.


However, as a result of COVID-19, PFR has put almost all of these plans’ recommendations on hold. There is no clear timetable or budget for putting these recommendations into action.

Friends of Guild Park is working with PFR on a small-scale plan to restart this process. A group of volunteers and PFR staff are focusing attention on the property around Guild Park’s Sculptor’s Cabin as the place to start implementing these plans.

This wooden cabin, built in 1942 as an artist’s studio, was recently restored and reopened by the City of Toronto, in partnership with Guild Park’s volunteer groups. To operate this cabin effectively as a visitors’ welcome/activity centre, Friends of Guild Park sees great potential to include more seating, signage and other park “furniture” as part of the landscape outside this cabin.

This initiative is in very early stages and has already incorporated many recommendations from Guild Park’s three plans. We see this “Landscape Plan” as a pilot project that keeps Guild Park continuing to get better.

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# Diversity and the GVCA

The GVCA is a volunteer, not-for-profit organization, led by a small Board of Directors. Each Board member brings unique skills, knowledge and perspective to the team, and as the current President I would be hard pressed to find a group that is more dedicated to ensuring that Guildwood is a great place to live.

However, the current Board does not represent the diversity of our community, and, to my knowledge, it never really has. Today the Board consists of 12 white, straight, mostly over 50 men and women, most with grown children, and almost all are long-time Guildwood residents. Is that sameness by design? No, but those are the facts all the same.

The latest census results for the Guildwood census area indicate that 30% of local residents self-identify as a visible minority and 23% indicated that their mother tongue was something other than English or French. Only 50% of the adults in the community are over 50. The census results for our area don't address religious beliefs,

sexual preference or gender identity but it is safe to assume that the Board doesn't reflect the breadth of Guildwood residents.

Does it matter? Well, I can't help but think that the community would truly benefit from a broader range of perspectives and experiences that a more representative Board might bring. What new community events and traditions might emerge? What new ideas might help to ensure everyone in the community feels welcome to participate in our events? This was a topic at our last Board meeting, and let me assure you that the Board is aligned on the need for change.

A core goal of the GVCA is to encourage active community involvement within Guildwood and volunteers are key to our success. I understand that you may not see people on the Board that are like you but if you are interested in helping Guildwood continue to be the great community you chose as your home, then we have everything that matters in common.

If you are interested in participating as a Board member, membership canvasser, News and Views delivery person or Guildwood Day volunteer, we want to hear from you (yes, even if you are a straight, 50+, white long-time resident.)

We will get back to all those activities as soon as we can safely do so and when we do, we would greatly appreciate having you on the GVCA team.

In addition, the Board has identified a few initiatives to introduce all new residents to the GVCA and welcome them as part of our Guildwood community.

I'll bet you've travelled past East Scarborough Storefront at 4040 Lawrence Avenue East, just west of Galloway Rd. You might even know that our building used to be a police station. I've been working there since 2015, and am writing to make sure Guildwood residents know even more about us!

I'll start by telling you how great it feels to be connected to The Storefront. I love that at The Storefront:

- » People feel welcome, safe and a sense of community and belonging.
- » Children, adults and seniors improve their health and well-being.
- » People learn, create, play and make positive things happen in the community.
- » A professional network of social service partners attends to complex and challenging human needs and serves people with empathy and kindness.
- » People find real and meaningful jobs.
- » People of all ages get support and encouragement to help realize their goals and dreams.

*The Storefront's purpose is to support people's aspirations by fostering a community ecosystem that grows stronger over time. We help the community work better together, for everyone's benefit.*

How did we get to be a place like this?

In the years leading up to our opening in January 2001, many

people in the area were in desperate need. Families who had been living closer to Toronto's core moved out to the suburbs in search of housing they could better afford. Also at that time, many refugees were being housed in the motels along Kingston Road (and some of those motels continue to be part of the City's shelter system). Back then, not many social services were available nearby, and taking transit to get to social services in other parts of town was a day-long affair.

Public Health staff and volunteers from faith communities were working in the neighbourhood, doing their best to help people. The needs were so great, though, that they felt overwhelmed, and knew something had to change. They decided to go door-to-door to take stock of the challenges and find out from people what supports were needed. And they really listened. After such deep engagement, the solution to providing services in the community was disarmingly simple (but not so easy!):

*No SINGLE agency or organization could meet the vast and varied needs of people in the community. But collectively, with organizations working together, the possibilities were great.*

After many months of discussion, consultation and building trust among more than 40 agencies, East Scarborough Storefront opened its doors in Morningside Mall. Each of the agencies offered their service in that one space. Word of mouth brought people in, and they

benefited from the one-stop-shop offered by the network of social service partners.

Back in 2007, when Morningside Mall got redeveloped into Morningside Crossing, The Storefront moved to our current location at 4040 Lawrence Avenue East, where people can still find the same variety and number of services and partners. The specific partners fluctuate with the community's needs, and we continue to work together to provide what people tell us is important to them.

» Community gardens, a vital source of physically distant recreation, companionship and affordable fresh produce for local residents this summer.

Right now, due to the pandemic, most in-person meetings with partners are paused. People can still access us and our partners online and over the phone five days a week. As of this writing, The Storefront is open and offering limited in-person services four days a week.

People sometimes ask me: “If you’ve been in the community helping people for nearly 20 years, why are there still so many people facing challenges?”

It’s a fair question. And there are as many ways to answer it as there are people in the neighbourhood. One response is that the community faces challenges that are long standing, and extremely difficult to solve, like high unemployment, food insecurity and ill health related to these problems, to name just a few.

The pandemic isn’t making these challenges any easier – quite the opposite. There is also a high concentration of subsidized housing around us (among the highest in the province), which means that there are a lot of people who live each day of their lives with the full reality of at least one big challenge, often more.

It’s so important that The Storefront and other organizations are part of and are working to serve the

community. Just like the group of people who were trying to support the neighbourhood realized 20 years ago: our whole community benefits when everyone works together.

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# Living Green

Thanks to a local Girl Guider, I offer the following recipe for environmentally sustainable beeswax wraps. I have tried these wraps and they really work well.

After use just wash and it will be ready to use again.

## What you need

- » Squares of 100% cotton fabric in varying sizes (try old sheets or pillow cases with fun patterns)
- » Beeswax, either grated or in pellets
- » Parchment paper

## What you do

Cover your ironing board with an old towel or similar. Place your fabric on top of parchment paper. Sprinkle the wax over the fabric. Cover with another sheet of parchment paper and iron until all the wax has melted. Then peel off the paper and hang the fabric to dry. It dries fast. Any wax that flows off the fabric you can peel off the paper and use again. Suggest not using fabric with a lot of red as for some reason it runs.



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# Birding in Guildwood

I have now lived for 40 wonderful years in the Guild. I feel so lucky to know that on any given day I can witness wildlife, such as deer, fox, coyote, opossum and mink (to name just a few) traversing my yard, the street, and through all our beautiful parks.

On top of these four-legged wanderers is the wide assortment of birds that frequent our neighbourhood. There are warblers and woodpeckers, corvids and chickadees, and so many songbirds I'd never be able to name all. Though it's so hard to admit I play favourites, I think I look forward to seeing birds of prey, such as owls, hawks, eagles and even turkey vultures, in the Guild the most.

People occasionally ask me how, out of all the possible hobbies, I ended up birding. The story began just 13 years ago with a Mother's Day present. My son, who, in his words, has always struggled to find me the right gift, decided that year upon a lovely bird feeder and a bag of mixed bird seed. A short while later I filled the feeder and my husband hung it from a tree out front. Within hours the first little sparrows and chickadees were gorging themselves, and within days we had a whole new community of birds visiting us daily. I actually began wondering, considering how often I was re-filling the feeder with seed, how much this little present was going to cost me!

My husband and I happened to be looking in the direction of the feeder one afternoon, when a fast-moving hawk flashed by, right in front of us, chasing one of our sparrows. Unsuccessful in the

pursuit, the larger bird landed in our neighbor's tree. I went inside, grabbed my old camera, took a photo, and found myself unable to identify the bird. I emailed the image to the Toronto Zoo, and they quickly responded, telling me I had seen an adult male Cooper's Hawk! My son now calls my bird feeder the Bird of Prey Feeder. Little did I know this amazing Cooper's Hawk was about to bring new friends, photography and amazing birds into my life.

As we approach the fall, the air is getting cooler and the leaves are falling, dropping bright colours on our sidewalks. The last-minute summer birds, such as hawks and eagles, are finally flying south. (Keep your eyes open near the bluffs, as you'll still see them flying along the water.) Now it is time to wear your warm jackets, winter hats and gloves and start looking for fall and winter birds.

Where is the best place in the Guildwood area to go looking? The Guild Inn. You've got a great chance there of seeing Northern Cardinals, Blue Jays, Black-capped Chickadees, Downy and Hairy Woodpeckers, White Breasted Nuthatches, Juncos and many more. All of these birds look amazing, with either the colourful autumn foliage or bright sheets of snow behind them, so bring your cameras. From the bluff's edge, or if you walk right down to the shore, you'll also see a wide variety of ducks, including Ring-billed Ducks, Golden Eyes, Long Tailed Ducks and Red Breasted Mergansers, which will soon arrive for the winter months.

If you go to the Guild you will see many regular birders there, and don't hesitate to say "hello." John and James Holcroft have been going for many, many years and know every tree, path and all the birds' secret hiding spots. Thanks to these guys, last year I got to see a Saw-whet owl in the middle of the park. Another of the regulars is Vicki Bowie, who walks there almost every single day. She sees many deer, all sorts of birds, and lots of painted rocks.

You should also keep your eyes open in the back of school yards as many geese and ducks will be landing there to rest. I know you're probably not impressed with another flock of Canada Geese, but not too long ago I received an exciting text from my friend Jennifer Kirby, telling me she spotted a single snow goose hanging out in the middle of a flock of Canada Geese in the field behind the Poplar Road Public School. You never know what you'll see, until you make the effort to go out and look.

How can you help and enjoy the birds during the coming winter? When putting up bird feeders, remember to place them in a sheltered area (out of wind and rain) and take care to find a location for them safely away from cats and other predators. Fill the feeders with black oil sunflower seeds and suet. (Suet is a high energy food that you can buy or make on your own.) Setting up a few bird feeders will also give youngsters a great educational experience and teach them how to enjoy nature, from a safe distance.

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
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# Reflections on My Years with Guild Festival Theatre

After eight years volunteering on the Guild Festival Theatre (GFT) Board of Directors in a wide variety of roles, I stepped aside this year. I'd like to share some experiences during my time with GFT.

I joined the GFT board at founder Sten Erik's urging in 2012, becoming Secretary-Treasurer in 2013. I also hosted board meetings at my home, plus show opening/closing parties, and eventually GFT equipment storage. When Sten became ill in early 2015, he asked me to become producer as well. Shocked at his untimely passing in April 2015, we scrambled to rebuild/recast *Romeo and Juliet* in his honour – which turned out to be our most successful production!

I was already involved in Guild Park as a volunteer board member for the Guild Renaissance Group and Friends of Guild Park and Gardens, plus the planning committee for The Guild Alive with Culture Arts Celebration, but I could not bear to lose Sten's dream of providing professional classic theatre on that stunning Greek Theatre in Guild Park. Sten vowed to "do for Scarborough what Stratford Festival Theatre did for Stratford," and I did whatever was needed to keep his legacy alive.

We received huge support from all three levels of government, our GFT board members, the Guildwood community itself as well as second Artistic Director, Jamie Robinson, plus the fabulous casts and crews over the years. Together we weathered the storms (rain, heat,

construction, critical loss of our main sponsor, end of Chartwell storage due to construction) and soldiered on, presenting well-received summer entertainment.

GFT provided me with a unique opportunity to learn about theatre from the inside, seeing how much talent and hard work goes into the creation of professional productions that look so effortless to the audience.

For years, I provided a brief history of the Guild of All Arts before each performance (having co-hosted so many walking tours with John Mason) and audiences appreciated learning about Rosa and Spencer Clark's vision in creating their unique art colony on this property in 1932.

It was a wonderful experience welcoming audience members to each show, and getting their reactions afterwards. The most memorable was a blind lady who took public transportation with her caregiver so that she could experience live theatre! Wow!

One of the benefits of seeing every performance is the realization that live theatre is not static – every show is a little different. Not just dealing with unforeseen circumstances, but the chance to see the actors grow into their roles, and also the opportunity to focus on the subtle background action carefully crafted by the director and cast.

I was surprised and humbled to be honoured for my volunteer efforts: a medal of appreciation from The Honorable John McKay, M.P.; awarded a Certificate of Appreciation by the City of Toronto Parks, Forestry & Recreation at their Volunteer Recognition Celebration; being named a Paul Harris Fellow by The Rotary Foundation; acting as Grand Marshall of the GVCA's Guildwood Day Parade in 2016!

Time passed, key people moved on, some literally moved away and GFT began a quest to rebuild.

In 2019, GFT attracted the creative team of Tyler J. Seguin and Helen Juvonen, both previously part of GFT. Tyler had served on the GFT board and honed his directing skills in Stratford. Helen assisted Sten in directing *The Misanthrope*, and is simply brilliant (a Jeopardy champion!).

Through their many contacts, they found young, keen new board members, and I felt that it was time to have these talented people assume the reins, taking Guild Festival Theatre to the next level of Sten's dream.

My experience as a volunteer with Guild Festival Theatre has been very rewarding – hard work yes, but friendships and satisfaction galore. I anticipate enjoying many future GFT productions!

So if you get an opportunity to volunteer, give it a try – you'll be glad you did! "Enjoy life, but make a difference!"

# Pet Hair in the Winter

Did you know that not all dogs and cats have the same type of coats? Some have hair (Maltese, Shih-tzus, Doodles/Poodles) which is continuously growing; others have fur (Labs, Jack Russells, pugs), which has a fixed maximum length.

It is a common misconception that hair-bearing animals should grow their coat throughout the winter months. It is not statistically proven that additional length beyond one inch from the skin adds warmth. In fact, this extra length can create a lot of additional maintenance for pet owners. Clumps of snow and debris stick to the hair and cause it to mat together. This will create discomforts for your pet, ranging from minor skin irritation to rashes, loss of circulation and sores.

It is for this reason that we recommend keeping a modest length on your pet's coat and getting a small wardrobe of layerable pieces for varying degrees of cold and wet weather. A windproof/waterproof layer, a base-layer of fleece or wool and some paw protection are all you need.

If you don't want to mess around with boots, get some paw wax. Fur-bearing animals also benefit from these layers and paw protection too. Both fur-bearing and hair-bearing animals benefit from regular brushing and maintenance, like nail trimming, bathing and regularly scheduled grooming visits regardless of the time of year to ensure the optimal health of these fur babies.

# This Holiday Season Stay Cyber Safe, Especially When Shopping Online

Cybercriminals are savvy, especially during the holidays.

Nearly 30 years after the World Wide Web went live on Tuesday, August 6, 1991, most people are still too trusting with their personal information online. Many still don't realize, or take it seriously, how little bits of information (data) can be pieced together to form a surprisingly accurate picture of your personal life. Intentional or not, disclosure of personal information makes it easier for cybercriminals to do their thing, such as identity theft or giving money to phony charities, to name a few of the possible consequences of being too forthcoming on the Internet.

There's also the double-edged sword of social media "TMI." Sharing your holiday plans (trips, parties, etc.) can draw unwanted attention. Never assume the information you post online is private or will remain so.

When it comes to cyber-safety, there is one hard-and-fast rule: Secure your social network profiles! Use a privacy scanning software to streamline your social network privacy settings. My go-to software is AVG Online Security, which is a free extension for Google Chrome.

Besides securing your social media profiles, the following best practices will further enhance your cyber-safety:

- » Be wary of posted links, especially by strangers.
- » Be cautious allowing yourself to be tagged in photos. (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter—most social media platforms—offer the option in your privacy settings to control if, and how, you can be tagged in a photograph.)

For a safe online shopping experience this holiday season, follow these tips:

1. **Before you make any online purchases, make sure your computer's operating system and software are up to date.** If you don't already have one, download a cybersecurity program. If you're shopping online through your phone instead of a desktop, ensure your phone has all the latest updates and runs a cybersecurity program. Watch for fake online shops. The holiday season is when many fake websites pop up. Spotting a legitimate website apart from a fraudulent one isn't as easy as it used to be. The purpose of an illegitimate website is to gather and compromise your personal information. Ensure the domain name is correct. If you're looking for a new Batman tool belt, make sure you're shopping on [www.batmantoolbelts.com](http://www.batmantoolbelts.com) and not [www.trendystyle.com](http://www.trendystyle.com). Note spelling and grammar mistakes (there should hardly be any), a red flag; the website may be fraudulent. If a deal seems too good to be true, be skeptical. It's doubtful Tiffany will offer an 80% discount on its HardWear link earrings in 18k gold. When unsure, look up

online reviews of the site. If the site is a scam, there likely will be warnings from other people. Also, call the vendor and verify they are legitimate. It's a red flag if a website doesn't have a contact number

*Important: Make sure the website you're on begins with https (Hypertext Transfer Protocol Secure), not http. The "s" stands for "secure," ensuring any data sent over that connection is encrypted and can't be read by hackers.*

2. **Watch for charity phishing scams.** The holidays are when we tend to feel charitable. Cybercriminals know this and try to take advantage of our goodwill. The most common scam is to send emails from a fake charity asking for donations. Another is to send emails that appear to come from a legitimate charity; however, the link(s) go to either malware or a fraudulent website. If you want to donate to charity, which I strongly suggest you do, contact the charity directly or go straight to their website.
3. **Don't click on pop-up ads or coupons.** You've probably noticed that when you're browsing for a product, pop-up ads tend to appear, some offering steep discounts on products. Many of these pop-ups take you to malicious sites, exposing you to cyberattacks. When an ad for a fantastic deal pops up, err on the side of caution and don't click on it—just click on the "X" to close it.

4. **Never shop using public Wi-Fi.** Public Wi-Fi is not secure. Anyone can gain access to a public network, monitor your activity, and steal your personal information. Always do your online shopping at home on a secure Wi-Fi connection.
5. **Be suspicious of spam texts.** Email filters are relatively good at filtering out spam; however, smartphones haven't entirely caught up. Fraudsters will send mass texts, often written in an urgent language, poor grammar, and an abundance of emojis and punctuation, promising huge discounts on sought-after brands. If you get this type of message, do not reply; you'll be alerting the sender your phone number is active. Simply delete it and mark it as junk.

Just as you would exercise caution with your wallet and belongings in a crowded mall, remember to be as vigilant when shopping online this holiday season.

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



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


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
